Animal's Name:
Periodontal disease is the most common health problem of dogs and cats, affecting up to 85% of pets. Not only does dental disease affect the mouth, it can damage other vital organs, including the heart, kidneys, liver, and lungs. By scheduling a dental procedure for your animal you are taking a very important step toward preserving your pet's health and comfort.  Our routine dental prophylaxis includes general anesthesia, a full oral exam, ultrasonic scaling and polishing of the teeth, fluoride treatment, and the application of a dental sealant. Preanesthetic bloodwork is available at an additional cost. Since our greatest concern is the well-being of your pet, we strongly recommend this bloodwork to identify potential health problems that could affect your animal's response to anesthesia. While a normal blood profile does not guarantee the absence of anesthetic complications,
it does help reduce associated risks and enables us to provide your pet with optimal care

Pre-op Panel: checks kidney, liver function, screens for diabetes & dehydration \$CBC, General Health Profile, Electrolytes: as above plus screens for anemia, inflammation/infection, pancreatitis, metabolic disease \$I decline bloodwork
Additionally, we recommend an IV catheter and fluid administration during all anesthetic procedures, especially in older animals or those with special needs. Fluids help maintain hydration and adequate blood pressure, and the catheter gives us venous access in case your pet should need IV antibiotics, pain medications, or emergency drugs.  -Catheter/fluids cost \$ Please initial your choice:accept/decline

In cases of severe periodontal disease with large tartar accumulations, tooth root exposure, and extreme gingivitis, increased anesthetic and procedure time necessitate an extended dental fee of \$ for cats and \$ for dogs.  The need for an extended dental may not be determined until an animal is anesthetized
